
These courses focus primarily on the on-field skills to help make you a more successful referee at the higher levels. At the completion of the classroom courses, both classes have challenging tests covering the Laws of the Game, AYSO Policies and Procedures and some additional information. The test material is NOT specifically covered during the course.

Know the 10 Direct Kick (Penal) Fouls (which become PKs if committed by the defense in their own Penalty area). See Law 12 for the complete wording. These (except for handling) are physical (mean) types of things:



Know the 7 Indirect Kick Fouls (These are more simple rule violations than the Direct Kick fouls) Four against Keepers:

- 1. Taking more than 6 seconds to get the ball back in play
- 2. Handling the ball after releasing it into play before somebody else touches it
- 3. Handling the ball after having it kicked to them by a teammate
- 4. Handling the ball from a throw-in by a teammate
- ** Remember, a keeper handling the ball outside their own penalty area is regular "handling" and is a direct kick foul.

Three against anybody:

- 5. Impeding an opponent
- 6. Interfering with a goalkeeper trying to get the ball back in play
- 7. Dangerous Play

Be sure you know which misconducts are Cautionable (Yellow Cards = "PUDDLED") and which are Send-Offs (Red Cards) and how restarts work with cautions and send-offs:

MISCONDUCT

There are seven cautionable offences:



- 1. Persistently infringes the Laws of the Game
- 2. Insporting behavior
- 3. Dissent by word or action
- 4. Delays the restart of play
- 5. Leaves the field of play without permission
- 6. Enters/re-enters the field of play without permission
- 7. Fails to respect the required Distance on a corner kick, free kick or throw-in

MISCONDUCT

There are seven send-off offences:



- 1. Serious foul play
- 2. Violent conduct
- 3. Spits at any person
- 4. Denies a goal or obvious goal-scoring opportunity by deliberately handling the ball
- 5. Denies an obvious goal-scoring opportunity by an offense punishable by a free kick or penalty kick
- 6. Offensive/insulting/abusive language or gestures
- 7. Receives a second caution in the same match
