AYSO referees are Volunteers and as such the IRS does not allow AYSO to pay volunteer referees for services rendered, however, AYSO can provide volunteers (referees, coaches, board members) with a stipend to reimburse them for the cost of volunteering. Each AYSO region can determine what that cost is and how much a stipend should be for any volunteer and account for that in their annual budgets for their regions. AYSO can hire referees from a company that provides referees. (Paid Services Agreement required). It's common for AYSO regions to offer training and support to their volunteer referees, including free uniforms and gear.

The core of AYSO's refereeing system is built on volunteers. This means most referees in AYSO are parents, older siblings, or community members who donate their time.

## No Standard Pay:

There isn't a standard, region-wide pay structure for AYSO referees.

Some regions may offer stipends or reimbursements to cover expenses like travel or game costs, but this is not a standard practice.

#### Incentives and Rewards:

While not paid, referees can earn incentives like community service hours, which can be beneficial for college applications. Some regions also offer prizes or awards for their volunteer referees.

# Training and Support:

AYSO provides extensive free training for its referees, including on-field mentoring and online resources.

### Benefits for Referees:

Refereeing in AYSO can offer benefits like learning the rules of the game, developing leadership and communication skills, and contributing to the community.

## Youth Referee Program:

AYSO also has a Youth Referee Program for kids as young as 12, which allows them to gain experience and potentially earn volunteer points and rewards.
